Name:

In 2021, World Vision pledges to sustain and, in specific countries increase, programming and advocacy actions to end child labour, including its worst forms, in at least nine countries* where World Vision works on this issue, as well as to continue strengthening child protection systems as part of World Vision's commitment to serving the needs of the most vulnerable girls and boys in 70 countries. We also pledge to ensure that children and adolescents, parents, communities, including faith communities, businesses, and governments are involved and mobilized in, and contribute to, collective efforts to sustainably end child labour, wherever World Vision works on this issue.

Description:

World Vision is already working on this pledge through our programmatic interventions that focus on multiple stakeholders including labour organizations, government bodies, private companies/organizations, and vulnerable children and their families. In addition to our programmatic implementation, our advocacy efforts also focus on implementing and enforcing local labour laws and standards, while encouraging further spending by governments on foreign assistance programs to address child labour.

Implementation plan:

Through our programmatic implementation and advocacy efforts, we hope to further our comprehensive abilities to bring multiple stakeholders to the table (private companies, government entities, and civil society groups) to eradicate child labor.

Impact:

World Vision is a partnership of multiple offices in the field implementing interventions and advocacy to address child labour and the support offices that secure funding and advocacy for these programs. These various offices addressing child labor each carry responsibility for the implementation and further commitment to the goals of addressing child labour.
